Caleb Schroeder, Our current Board president shared what is means to be a nonprofit 501c3. While making a


profit is not our purpose, we are ethically & legally mandated to assure that all proceeds are applied to our stated mission.

now are asking for help to fund staffing needs so we can more effectively meet the needs of those who come to us. We had served over 100 individuals or families both years in both long and short term service capacities, and it is imperative that we have multiple staff roles to improve our effectiveness in the outreach. True helping requires time and relationship.

Julie Brown shared a stirring personal story about her overwhelm with being a young divorced single parent years ago. She articulated how if Crossroads existed then, the support we offer may have enabled her to latch onto resources and be emotionally built up so she could have avoided obstacles. She encouraged



the community to share in our work to strengthen families and meet them where they are at in their need.

Angie Rosener with her brother John Thies drove the message of how God loves us even in our brokenness and wants to use it toward lives that have been 'repurposed or upcycled' to shine for Him through four wonderful and inspiring songs. (Thank you, Angie and John!)

These two pieces involved incredible workmanship and wonderfully captured the theme of God's restoration in us. Larry Kepford cut the maple trees for the buffet in Missouri and then hand milled the lumber before using the spaulted maple to create this piece. Before this building project, Larry had suffered a debilitating stroke. He was regaining strength and agility was unable

to do his woodworking at that point. So this project was coached by Larry while his brother-in-law, Kevin Namanny learned the skill and completed the maneuvers Larry was unable to do.

The roll top desk was also incredible workmanship, made by Larry of hand milled Walnut. Understanding the work we do at Crossroads, Larry wanted to make the furniture available for our auction. Crossroads purchased them far under value with sponsorship donation by Denny & Coleen Bruhn of Schleswig.

Dave & Jac Friedrichsen bought the buffet on the auction. They are especially pleased with the piece because not only is it beautiful, but they were first acquainted with Larry & Peg years ago when both families emotionally invested in foster care with their efforts focusing on restoration of children in placement who had come from broken homes, hurting families. The buffet symbolizes for them how the journey to healing can be a long and hard road and, in the end, beautiful and rewarding.

The names Marilyn
Nemitz and Bobbi Garcia
are very familiar at the
Denison Senior Center
because these two are the
hub of the activities that
occur there. They are
incredibly dedicated to
being there early every
morning to cook an
average of 70 meals per day
for seniors in Crawford
County while answering



the phone constantly. Some meals are eaten on site, some or delivered by volunteer drivers to the seniors' doors. No matter what, the meals are fresh, hot and delicious! THANK YOU, Bobbi & Marilyn for your excellent work and for making such a difference for so many.

Crossroads coordinates the Meals on Wheels program for Schleswig seniors. Besides taking calls for those who do and do not want meals delivered to Schleswig on Tuesdays and Thursdays, they complete the intake paperwork, keep records on deliveries, schedule the volunteer drivers, and respond to individual things going on for the seniors who take the meals. We are grateful to offer this service to our seniors!

Did you know?

Meals on Wheels is NOT income based. It is a federal program available to any person over age 60 or who is home bound, and to the caregiver of that person. The ultimate goal of Meals on Wheels is to provide nutrition and accessibility of healthy meals to seniors.

Meals on Wheels are available each weekday in Denison, unless it is a holiday or weather is bad, and by delivery to Schleswig on Tuesday and Thursday and to other communities as well. Members who receive Meals on Wheels get to choose what days they do or do not accept a meal.

The prices for Meals on Wheels are SUGGESTED, rather than set and charged. Recipients can offer any amount. The average price per meal is about \$6. The monies collected from any recipients are directly turned into the Senior Center for new food expenses.

Some communities have closed their Meals on Wheels programs because they were not able to become self-sustaining. This is why the more that financially contribute to Meals on Wheels, the stronger the program and the more seniors can be served!

UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST

THANK YOU! United Church of Christ in Schleswig has been a huge help in boosting Crossroad's work for each of the three years we have been in operation. This past September a financial gift from an endowment has been especially helpful. We are incredibly blessed that the endowment funds are available for



undertakings that revolve around being the hands and feet of Jesus in serving our neighbors.



The grant proposal was written for a Crossroads staff member to be a presence in Schleswig. When Crossroads started, the Schleswig community was quickly involved in donations, volunteering, and support for what we had set out to do. With quick growth in numbers of those we serve all over the county, the one-to-one time with those in Schleswig community soon became

challenged. The grant award allowed for Crossroads to hire Sandy Hummel as a Schleswig Service Coordinator (part time).

Sandy and her husband Jeff moved to Schleswig in 2012. They have two adult daughters in Minnesota and Omaha and a son in Japan. Sandy is a natural at befriending others in Christian love. Using the Meals on Wheels service as a springboard for engaging in more helping ways, she has recently begun her efforts to support the needs of the senior citizens in the Schleswig area, and she will also field other families to Janette's involvement as needed. We are so pleased she has joined our staff and we enjoy her gentle and fun-loving nature. Welcome, Sandy! And THANK YOU, UCC for enabling this!

called to check if we had anything possibly available. In a short phone visit, we learned that huge medical issues and expenses were causing hardship, and the teen was growing so fast they couldn't keep up. Finding a couple sweatshirts with the heavier winter coat and handing them multiple items was tear jerking for the mom, and the teen was a happy camper with the style.

Another 'God thing' was a person who lost their spouse to a difficult death asking if we could use the larger sizes offered. I assured them that all sizes were needed, but the very next a person gratefully received two of them since one was lighter weight, and had commented how they were afraid larger sizes would not be available. I told them exactly the story of them coming in, and they were nearly in tears.
